PLAN FOR THE YEAR AHEAD

- Grades are especially important this year because this is possibly the last set of grades a college will see before making an admission decision.
- Use Naviance to learn the admission requirements for your schools of interest.
- Make lists of your abilities, preferences, and personal qualities.
- List things you may want to study and do in college.
- Visit with college representatives who come to the school in the fall & spring. If it is a college you are interested in, make sure you introduce yourself to the representative and ask a valid question about the school.
- Have parents fill out the College Counselors' required parent questionnaire before scheduling Junior Meeting with the College Counseling Office (in late January).
- Be thinking about whom you will ask for recommendations. You will need to inform the teachers you choose before the summer break that you will need a letter from them.
- Start visiting local colleges: large, small, public, and private. Get a feel for what works for you. Develop a list of 15-20 colleges that interest you.
- Continue to be involved in your community, school and church. Remember, students must earn 10 hours of community service each non-COVID year while at SCS. Students earning 50 hours or more each non-COVID year will receive the Christian Service Award at graduation. Up to half of the hours earned may be earned through SCS opportunities. You can start accumulating hours June 1.

PLAN YOUR SPRING TESTING SCHEDULE

- Look at the school calendar and compare it to the SAT/ACT dates. Look for conflicts with sporting events, prom, homecoming, and any other important school dates.
- Take the PSAT at school in October. Remember the PSAT your junior year is the only test that qualifies you to become a National Merit Scholar.
- In the second semester of your junior year take both the ACT and SAT at least once.
- Prepare and do well on AP Exams to receive credit at most colleges.

PLAN AHEAD FOR THE SUMMER & SENIOR YEAR

- Prepare to take the SAT or ACT again. You wouldn't take any other test in high school without preparing for it, so think of this as preparing for the most important test of your high school career.
- Review your senior year class schedule with your guidance counselor. Challenge yourself with honors and AP classes and stick with sequences you've begun, in the languages, for example.
- Plan summer activities early. Enrich yourself by volunteering, getting an interesting job or internship, or signing up for special summer learning programs.
- Take a full schedule. Colleges look closely at your senior schedule.
- Take some time to work on your college application essays. It is less stressful to write in the summer without other academic responsibilities.
- Check with applytexas.org to see if you can start your college applications in July.
- Update your Common Application.
- Finalize your resume.

KEEP YOUR MOMENTUM THIS SUMMER

- Prepare and sign up to take the SAT and ACT in the spring.
- Visit and tour colleges. Spend some time in the city and area around the campus. At colleges you are serious about, schedule interviews with admissions counselors, if available.

DUAL CREDIT VS. ADVANCED PLACEMENT

Southwest Christian School has developed a strong Dual Credit program through partnerships with Colorado Christian University, LeTourneau University, and other schools. Through these courses, many SCS students graduate with college credit, some receiving upwards of 30 hours. Additionally, SCS offers several AP courses as another means of achieving college credit. Determining which option is best for an individual student can be challenging. Below is a list of considerations and benefits to each option:

HOW IS THE GRADE DETERMINED?	A Dual Credit grade is based on a full semester of classwork. The same grade is posted on the SCS and college or university transcripts. Scores range from 1-5 with a 3 or higher needed to receive credit (in most cases). Students receive honors credit at SCS for the course.
HOW IS THE GRADE TRANSFERRED?	Students will have a college transcript indicating all college credits earned, and they will need to submit all dual credit transcripts to their college.	Students request their AP score to be sent to their college.

ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS:

- Entering college with a large number of credits can be beneficial to students wanting to take fewer hours per semester or students intending to graduate from college early to pursue an advanced degree.
- Many schools require students to declare their major at the completion of 30-45 hours. If your child is unsure of his or her future plans, this can unnecessarily accelerate such decisions.
- Most colleges require all coursework to be taken on campus once a student has completed a designated number of hours. This can result in limited options for taking courses (i.e., summer school/Jan. terms) at another school.
- It is the responsibility of the student to check each university's policy on Dual Credit and AP requirements.

KEEP YOUR MOMENTUM THIS SUMMER

- Prepare and sign up to retake the SAT in August and/or the ACT in September.
- Visit and tour colleges. Spend some time in the city and area around the campus. At colleges you are serious about, schedule interviews with admissions counselors, if available.
- Check important dates; Some universities have early dates or rolling admissions. Each college has their own deadlines.

PULLING YOUR APPLICATION TOGETHER

- Narrow your list of colleges to between 5 and 10 and review it with your college counselor. Visit as many as possible.
- Make a master calendar and note:
 - Test dates, fees, and deadlines
 - College application due dates
 - Required financial aid applications and their deadline
 - Recommendations, transcripts, and other necessary materials
- Write application essays and ask teachers, parents, and friends to read first drafts.
- Sign up to test again if your scores are not in line with your college admission requirements.

APPLYING EARLY

- The Apply Texas application opens on July 1. The Common Application opens August 1.
- Remember, the goal is to submit a well done (perfect) application, not the earliest application.
- Send your SAT scores at collegeboard.com and your ACT scores through ACT.org.
- Request your transcript on Naviance.
- Attend fall meetings with colleges visiting SCS.
- Ask if your college offers an early estimate of financial aid eligibility.

FINANCIAL AID: APPLY EARLY. APPLY RIGHT.

- Submit your FAFSA as soon as it opens October 1.
- Check to see if your college requires the CSS Profile for financial aid.
- Men 18 or older must register for the selective service to receive federal financial aid.

A comprehensive college guide will be given to each rising senior at their individual student/parent meeting in the spring.

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ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS:

- Entering college with a large number of credits can be beneficial to students wanting to take fewer hours per semester or students intending to graduate from college early to pursue an advanced degree.
- Many schools require students to declare their major at the completion of 30-45 hours. If your child is unsure of his or her future plans, this can unnecessarily accelerate such decisions.
- Most colleges require all coursework to be taken on campus once a student has completed a designated number of hours. This can result in limited options for taking courses (i.e., summer school/Jan. terms) at another school.
- It is the responsibility of the student to check each university's policy on Dual Credit and AP requirements.
